# Project Overview

Local Economic and Social Strengthening - Phase IV (LESS IV) Project was implemented to address the socio-economic challenges faced by conflict-affected communities in the Northern Province of Sri Lanka and Sri Lankan refugees in South India. The project created an enabling environment that promoted resilience, social cohesion, and sustainable development for vulnerable populations. Key activities included Facilitating psychosocial support and community cohesion programs, Improving government coordination and support structures, Supporting CSO-led economic development programs, Identification of market-based livelihood opportunities and provision of material support and Increase the access to vocational education and skill development programs for youth. Additionally, monitoring socio-economic dynamics, Studying the factors and challenges associated with the reintegration process was done. The project deepened engagement in Mannar, Vavuniya, and Kilinochchi Districts in Sri Lanka. It also continued the services in Non camp settings in 12 districts in Tamil Nadu and 53 Refugee camps. ADRA India as the implementing partner in Tamil Nadu expanded the toll-free Helpline and Drop-In Center (DIC) services to Kerala during this phase. The outcomes included improved socio-economic conditions, increased voluntary repatriation and successful reintegration of returnee populations, reduced inclination towards illegal migration, and long-term sustainable development through enhanced livelihoods and economic opportunities.






# Project Overview

"Addressing the Immediate and Medium-Term Needs of the Rural and Estate Communities in Creating Environmental and Nutritional Development (AIM-RECCEND)" 1 project, funded by the European Union and implemented by ADRA, ran for 14 months from December 2022 to January 2023 in the Nuwara Eliya, Matale, and Monaragala districts of Sri Lanka. These projects built on the ACCEND project's success in improving health, nutrition, hygiene, and sanitation in rural and estate communities.

In response to the COVID-19 pandemic and economic crisis, AIM-RECCEND focused on enhancing institutional capacity to manage pandemics and increasing community resilience. Rapid assessments identified urgent needs for food security, livelihood support, and education. Interventions included home gardens, community gardens, and community-led dairy centers to increase the nutritional resilience of the communities. Project also supported the community with school feeding programs as emergency response to up lift the nutritional status. Construction of handwashing stations in schools and Child development centers were key activities in prevention of pandemic.




# Project Overview

Project Overview

The Women Led Local Economic Development (WE-LED) Project, which ran from October 1, 2022, to March 31, 2024, successfully supported women-led small-scale enterprises in building sustainable businesses and fostering economic prosperity in semi-urban and rural communities in Sri Lanka. In response to the economic crisis post-pandemic, the project provided vital support for women in vulnerable households, adapting its implementation to address significant migration challenges. The project effectively combined online and in-person trainings, covering key areas such as business planning, branding, access to financing, entrepreneurship, and marketing strategies. Partnerships with the Institute of Growth Concepts and active engagement through platforms like WhatsApp facilitated comprehensive support and training for the beneficiaries, ultimately enhancing their business acumen and resilience.



Mahesh, a father of two from Anapallama in the Monaragala District, has significantly improved his family's quality of life thanks to the AIM RECCEND I Project, funded by the European Union and implemented by ADRA Sri Lanka.

Struggling as laborers with a modest income, Mahesh and his wife faced challenges providing for their children's education and nutrition. Selected for the project's home gardening initiative, Mahesh gained skills in organic farming, compost production, chicken rearing, and dietary planning. The project also provided essential tools, seeds, and a water pump to support his efforts.

As a result, Mahesh's home garden now produces abundant vegetables and eggs, ensuring nutritious meals and generating extra income through surplus sales. He is expanding his chicken farm and plans to start an organic fertilizer business, inspired by his success.

Grateful for the program's impact, Mahesh hopes similar initiatives will benefit other families, fostering healthier food practices and sustainable futures for communities across Sri Lanka.



On April 26, 2023, ADRA Sri Lanka organized a "Mega Career Fair" in Mannar Town at the District Secretariat premises as part of the Local Economic and Social Strengthening (LESS) Project (2020–2023). The event aimed to enhance youth employment in local industries and foreign jobs while discouraging illegal migration driven by economic hardships.

Objectives Achieved

- Raised awareness about local and foreign job opportunities.
- Introduced vocational training and higher education institutes.
- Offered career counseling and guidance.
- Enabled employers to recruit candidates.
- Promoted safe migration pathways.

#### Partnerships and Preparation:

The event was held in collaboration with the Mannar District Secretariat, Voice Area Federation, and Child Fund Sri Lanka. A mobile awareness campaign using loudspeakers and IEC materials reached the Mannar district's five DS divisions, informing youth about the fair and emphasizing safe migration. Key Outcomes:

- Participation: 1,747 youth attended, supported by transport arranged for all divisions.
- Pre-registration: 3,181 youth registered via a Google form, facilitating organized outreach.
- Engagement: Participants attended career guidance sessions, met employers, and explored training opportunities.
- Employer Contribution: 54 employers participated, conducting interviews and recruitment.
- Safe Migration Awareness: LESS Project set up a stall with a resource person from the Foreign Employment Bureau to guide youth on safe migration pathways.

The career fair successfully addressed unemployment and migration challenges while empowering youth with information and resources for a secure future.







Randenigodayaya is a small village in the Wellawaya area of Monaragala district, surrounded by beautiful paddy fields and mountains. While the scenery is stunning, life in the village has always been tough, especially during the dry seasons. For years, the people here struggled to get enough water for their daily needs. The preschool, community center, and clinic in the village were hit hardest, leaving families to find ways to cope.

During the dry season, parents would carry buckets of water from nearby sources just so their children could attend preschool and have their basic needs met. Pregnant mothers visiting the clinic faced constant difficulties due to the lack of water. Though the government had installed a water system in the village, it only provided water at scheduled times during the driest months.

When ADRA Sri Lanka's team heard about the struggles of Randenigodayaya, they knew something needed to change. After listening to requests from the community and confirming the need through technical assessments, the village was selected for a water supply project.

Through ADRA's support, an overhead tank was constructed, borehole drilling was completed, and solar-powered systems were installed to ensure a consistent water supply. After the project was handed over to the community, they took their initiative a step further. With support from another private donor, the community was able to install a purification system (RO plant). This allowed the villagers to use the water not only for their general needs but also for safe drinking. The community also contributed significantly to the effort by modifying the existing structure of the tank and building a new operating room.

The private donor provided the filtration system, and the socity make enabling the village to supply clean drinking water to the preschool and clinic free of charge. For long-term sustainability and maintenance, they sell drinking water to the wider community at just 3 rupees per liter.

Today, life in Randenigodayaya is very different. With the new water system in place, families no longer have to worry about carrying water during the dry season. The preschool now has a steady water supply, making it easier for children to continue their studies without interruptions. The teachers, too, are relieved and happy, knowing they can maintain a clean and safe environment for the kids. Pregnant mothers have seen the biggest change. They can now attend their monthly clinic visits without the added stress of managing without water. Attendance has increased, and the clinic has become a much more comfortable and welcoming place for them. The villagers are also practicing good sanitation, which is now fully functional, thanks to the reliable water supply. Cleanliness and hygiene have improved, creating a healthier environment for everyone. One villager named Mrs. Nilnthy, secretary of the society, shared, "We are so happy now. During the dry seasons, we don't have to worry anymore because we have enough water for the whole village. It's such a relief."

This project stands out as a success story of collaboration and sustainability. The community's proactive involvement and partnership with donors have ensured that the water system benefits everyone, now and for years to come. The innovative management of resources and the provision of affordable drinking water reflect the lasting impact of this initiative on the village's well-being and self-reliance.

### **Success Story 04**

In the picturesque village of Ormidale in Nuwara Eliya, the Devakanda Tamil School faced seven beauty, the daily struggles of the community were evident in the school's infrastructure. With boys, girls, and staff. These facilities were frequently unhygienic, lacked proper waste disposal sygirls, who often had to miss school during their menstrual cycles or leave the premises in search

The sanitation crisis at the school became a pressing issue when the Zonal Education Department European Union and ADRA UK, and implemented by ADRA Sri Lanka, the project team decided funds to renovate old, abandoned toilets and flooding caused by the school's muddy terrain, wh
